

FEAST LIGHT MASSACHUSETTS *Ready for More Blessings in 2024!* By BRO. ENRICO 'ROCKY' TALAMAYAN

MASSACHUSETTS is one of the original States of the United States. It is part of New England, a region lying in the northeastern corner of the country, comprising six states. It is bounded by Vermont and New Hampshire to the north, Rhode Island and Connecticut to the south, New York to the west, and the Atlantic Ocean to the east.





Boston, the State capital, lies on Massachusetts Bay, an arm of the Atlantic Ocean, and more than one-fourth of the total, including part of the Charles River, Boston Harbor, and a portion of the Atlantic is water.

The original inhabitants of Massachusetts were tribes of the Algonquian language family, a subfamily of the indigenous languages of the Americas.

Massachusetts, the seventh smallest state in the United States, is the first of the States to have an Indian name--from the Algonquin word *Massadchu-es-et* which means *great-hill-small-place*, said to refer to Blue Hill, which can be seen south of Boston.

Hunting and Fishing in Massachusetts

With the forest and rivers around them, the ancient tribes lived as hunters as well as fishermen.

Fast forward to the Third Millennium, Massachusetts is now home to Filipinos who hunt and fish for men--for the Lord. Just like the fishermen Simon called Peter and Andrew, casting their net into the Sea of Galilee, who promptly followed Jesus when He told them:

"Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." -- Matthew 4:19 At right, here we are, my wife Agie and I,



blessed to be "fishers", now called *Planters* of the Feast Light Massachusetts.

Yes, like most stories of immigrants in the U.S., it all started with the Dream. The American Dream of prosperity in the land of milk and honey-- which needed medical professionals.

I earned three degrees: Doctor of Medicine, Master of Arts in Nursing, and Bachelor of Science in Nursing. So, yes, I am among the throng who sought the American Dream.

Today, I work as a Registered Nurse-Healthcare Quality Specialist at Baystate Noble Hospital in Westfield, Massachusetts.

Agie, who holds degrees in Bachelor of Science in Psychology and Master of Arts in Guidance and Counseling, with academic units completed in Doctor of Philosophy in Counseling Psychology, has chosen the better designation as homemaker.

Little did we know, God had another dream for us. Yes, to plant The Feast in Massachusetts.

It has been a long journey of challenges -- all of which we count as blessings. Here they are...

The Light of Jesus

When we were still in Manila, I was then an active member of a spiritual community. Some of my friends in this community attended The Feast, the Sunday faith gathering of the Light of Jesus Family, and they invited me to come with them.



Over time, I got to love attending The Feast, I eventually joined the LOJ and I invited Aigie, then still my girlfriend, to join the LOJ.

We attended The Feast at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC) within the Manila Bay complex. Thus, it is called the Feast Bay Area.

Through the LOJ and The Feast, we found our travel buddies in our faith journey. There is nothing better than being

with God-centered friends and family. To this day, at The Feast, every gathering is life-giving, love tank-filling, and spirit-filled for us.



Our Family

Here I am with my ever precious blessing-- Aigie and our children, *from left:* Xander Mico, turned 2 years old on Valentine's Day, February 14; Benedict Marco, 4 years old, in preschool; and Luis Matteo, 7 years old, now in Grade 2.

And here's my journey toward this blessing:

I applied for a United States immigrant visa in 2007. The process for visa approval took a while. In the meantime, Aigie and I became boyfriend and girlfriend in 2012.

Soon, in my third year in Medicine at the Far Eastern University- Nicanor Reyes Medical



Foundation, there was already a chance that the visa would be approved and I would already be able to go to the U.S.

I knew already at that time that Aigie was the one, the girl of my dreams, the mother of my future kids, the light of my household, the woman that I wanted to spend my entire life with. So, I had to decide whether to leave her in the Philippines and we go through a long-distance relationship for a while or get married as soon as possible, include her in my petition, and migrate together. We chose the latter.

We primarily did not go for church wedding because we were pressed for time and resources. We needed the little savings we had for our plan to migrate. So, we opted for a civil wedding in 2015. It was not an easy decision. Living together outside the sacrament of marriage is like "living in sin" or "living not in the state of grace". We confessed this many times over, even before, during, and after we lived together and started to have kids.



Through the loving guidance and support of our Light of Jesus Community, Aigie and I finally had our church wedding. at St. Thomas the Apostle Parish, West Springfield, MA, on April 16, 2023, with Feasters – Team Dequito, Team Sumbeling, Team Goco, Team Basa and Team Agustin.

What a day it was. We received God's overwhelming mercy and love. We decided to keep it simple and celebrate that special moment with none other than our Feast Light Massachusetts family and our dearest friends from Feast U.S.

We committed to renew our "Yes" to God daily and continue to be a witness and be a light of Jesus to others, through the intercession of Mother Mary and St. Joseph, all for God's glory. Since then, we have felt liberated from the bondage of sin and began receiving graces upon graces.

The Feast United States


By Divine Design, we were able to migrate to the U.S., in the state of Massachusetts, in 2017. Unfortunately, there was no Feast in Massachusetts then. So, there was a big hole and deep longing in our spiritual life at that time.

To make matters worse, that was the time of the onslaught of the Coronavirus Disease (COVID) Pandemic. At the height of the Pandemic, Aigie and I went through the valley of isolation and despair. We were already reaching a point of suicidal ideations during our first few years here in the U.S.

But it was when we hit our rock-bottom moment that we met Jesus most deeply. Jesus was the 'Rock" at the bottom.

In desperation, via Facebook Messenger, I reached out to Feast New York (NY), which was the closest Feast in our area --about 135 miles away. God sent Bro. Pete Redito, former builder of Feast NY, like an angel in disguise, when we got connected to Feast NY. Thank God, Bro. Pete (*here* with his wife Sis. Ana and during an earnest online meeting with co-Feasters) responded to my chat and journeyed with us.

Through the guidance and support of Feast NY, Feast Light Massachusetts was born on October 22, 2022, the Feast Day of Pope Saint John Paul II.

Building Our Feast

IT was not easy, yet building Feast Massachusetts has been a priceless blessing for us.

Filipinos in Massachusetts in general and even most of our local members had minimal or lack of prior encounter and knowledge of the Light of Jesus Family and The Feast. Only a few of them heard about the brilliance of our founder, Bro. Bo Sanchez.

We started from the ground up. We gradually took steps to plant The Feast in Massachusetts, hurdling one issue after another.

Organization. We started small, as in organizing as a Feast Light with 16 members, not counting children. This is like a mini-version of the Light of Jesus Feast, with the same program: Worship, Talk, Sharing.

Content. Initially, our Feast Light was from 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Most of the Feast videos were about 40 minutes long. We wanted to shorten the preaching part to allot more time for group sharing.

I was then preaching online and would usually finish the talk part within 15 minutes. Sometimes we invited preachers and highlight sharers from other Feasts in the U.S. It had a lot of positive feedback from our attendees, but that format was difficult to sustain. There were nights when we had to extend beyond two hours due to lengthy preaching, sharing.

During our first year, we met online twice a month, every 2nd and 4th Saturday. We initially used the "older" Feast topics. We later decided to keep up with the latest Talk series in the Philippines by covering two talks in one gathering. When I preached, I compressed 2 talks in 30 minutes. We were able to do it for a while, but sometimes it could be lengthy and dragging for the participants.

From 'Big' to 'Light'

Attendance. In the beginning, we had a good number of attendees. We did The Feast online, so, some of our attendees joined from other parts of the globe. Then, the number of participants slowly dwindled over time mainly due to work schedule conflicts and the evolving priorities of our members. Life happens, as we say.

As part of our strategy to invite more people to join The Feast, we joined private Facebook groups of Filipinos living here in Massachusetts and posted our activities on social media. We even went to the National Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette in Attleboro, Massachusetts, during the Philippine Independence Day celebration in 2023 to promote our Feast by giving out flyers.

We wanted to grow big. We initially directed our efforts during our first year to transition into a full-blown Feast as soon as possible. In our perspective, the bigger the better. We thought the measure of success was to have a big Feast. We wanted to create a music ministry, food ministry, and all other ministries. We started looking around in parishes and event places for a venue so we could start gathering and making it big.

But reality hit us. It does take time and a lot of nurturing, pruning, and perseverance to grow. Through the guidance of our Feast leaders and the teachings that we received from our Feast International Leaders' Meeting with Bro. Vic Español, we redirected our efforts into building multiple Feast Lights and Light Groups (LG) instead. Our scorecard had changed.

As a means to improve, we would always ask our attendees for feedback, consult our leaders, and continue to evaluate our approach just like what we learned from Bro. Bo.

Hello, 2024!

QUALITY and QUANTITY. That's our goal in 2024.

Our goal is to continue our Light of Jesus core mission, *Go make disciples of all nations* (Matthew 28: 19-20), and grow deeper in faith.

Our approach is to invest in both quality and quantity; to commit to the consistency and frequency of our Feast gatherings. We want to be more intentional and meet with our Feasters in person more often. We want to create more opportunities to connect and serve with them.

Here is our Feast Light Massachusetts 2024 Monthly Schedule:
1st week: Online --or Hybrid (meeting in person and online): Light Group (LG)
Day and Time: Variable/To Be Determined (TBD)

2nd week: Online: Feast Light; Saturday, 8-9:30 p.m.

3rd week: Online (or Hybrid) Feast Light, Saturday, 8-9:30 p.m.

4th week: In-person Fellowship/ Gathering; Day and Time: Variable/TBD

More Feast Planters. Our Feast Light MA is open to all attendees from

different parts of the U.S. and Bahamas, as well as other parts of the world.

We commit to having at least weekly connect points with our Feasters.

Part of our goal is to plant new Feast Lights. We have core members living in different parts of Massachusetts. We would love for them to grow in faith and to soon become Feast Light Planters in their area.

Since some of our solid attendees are coming from a region/country without a Feast, like Sis. Marti Ramsundar from Trinidad and Tobago, we pray that soon we can usher in planting a Feast Light there as well.

Video Talks. Currently, I have opted not to preach *live* online in our Feast Light. Instead, we have gone back to watching compressed Feast Light video talks.

Our primary resource is the Feast Light Bay Area (English) video. We believe that by showing our members the basic design or blueprint of a Feast Light, they can grow into becoming a Feast Light Planter themselves. With this format, they won't think that they have to be a preacher to become a Feast Light Planter.

Weekly Teachings. We still want to keep pace with the weekly teachings at The Feast in the Philippines. We follow the schedule of Feast Bay Area.

The idea is that we will just be a week or a talk behind them. Since we have our Feast Light only twice a month, in the weeks (1st, 4th, or 5th week) that we do not meet, we do what we term as "Feast Light Massachusetts DIY (Do It Yourself)".



During those weeks, we post the corresponding Feast Light videos on our Facebook page, Feast Light Massachusetts, and also send the video link directly to our members via FB Messenger. We encourage them to watch this video at their most convenient time and do personal reflection. We plan to discuss and reinforce those learnings in our Light Groups, as needed.

Seminars and Other Growth Opportunities. Sis Aigie and I actively engage in the planning and implementation of our Feast activities here on the East Coast, U.S., and Bahamas, together with other Feast leaders. We are looking into having Light Group Workshop, Jesus Encounter, and other growth opportunities for us and our members.

This year, we also hope to be involved in a local outreach program within Massachusetts, as a Feast Community. We collaborate with other Feasts on the East Coast for possible joint venture projects or fellowship opportunities like gathering during Divine Mercy weekend at the National Shrine located here in Massachusetts.

Weekly Feasts. Unlike in the Philippines, most of the Feasts or Feast Lights internationally meet only once or twice a month.

My dream, at least here in Massachusetts, is to have a weekly Feast gathering. I know it is going to be hard, but everything is grace, and nothing is impossible with God. We are dreaming big because we have a big God.

I understand that small is big and slow is fast. We always surrender our plans to God and pray that His will be done. We do what we can and let God be God.

One Soul at a Time

Deeper Connections. In just our first year of service here in Feast Light Massachusetts, we have witnessed a lot of miracles, transformations, and inspiring stories already.

For the celebration of Philippine Independence Day in 2023, we went to the National Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette in Attleboro, Massachusetts, to give out Feast promotional flyers.

There, we met Sis Marj and Bro. Dave Garceau and their beautiful daughter, Lu.

Sis. Marj mentioned that day that she has been looking and praying for a spiritual community. It was an answered prayer indeed. Since then, she and her family have been journeying with us in our Feast Light.

Just like all of us, Sis. Marj also has her share of struggles in her personal and faith journey. Despite her busy schedule, as much as she could, she joined our consecration to St. Joseph last year. She wanted to grow more in the Catholic faith, with her family.


Recently, Sis. Marj shared that they are planning to have their church wedding and baptism of Lu.

By serving, we need to be ready for the avalanche of blessings coming our way. Walking where Jesus walked is not easy, but it is the worthiest path to take.


